Welcome to the Spring 2018 edition of Aspire, the semi-annual newsletter of the American Alliance of Academic Chief Residents in Radiology (A3CR2). For the newly minted chief residents, congratulations

on your appointments and welcome to our community. A3 is the organization, under the Association of University Radiologists (AUR), dedicated to empowering chief residents to succeed in this important leadership role. It is my honor to invite you to the 66th annual AUR meeting, being held May 7-10, 2018, in sunny Orlando, FL at the Omni Orlando Resort at ChampionsGate. Over the past several months, the steering committee, under the guidance of faculty advisor Dr. Peter Liu, has been hard at work putting together a fantastic program. Aside from the exciting line up of speakers, the AUR 2018 meeting will serve as a great platform for networking, leadership development, and collaboration with your peers.

This year's timely theme is "Health and Wellbeing of the Profession and the Professional." With all the talk recently about physician burnout, it is critical that as chief residents we develop an understanding of this topic to best serve our junior colleagues. The centerpiece of the AUR meeting will be the annual Brogdon Panel with the title of "Understanding and Mitigating Burnout Across Various Practice Settings," which will be an exciting panel of people from both academic and private practices moderated by Dr. Richard Gunderman.

The training track sessions will have a panel discussion on the "Psychology of Leadership" with panelist Drs. Frank Lexa, Cheri Canon, and Alex Norbash. Other sessions will focus on how to maximize your success with social media led by Dr. Amy Patel, Interviewing and Diversity by Dr. Nolan Kagetsu, effective teaching methods by Dr. Dave Naegar, and effective mentoring with Drs. Carolyn Meltzer and Mahan Mathur. As with prior years, we will have robust problem-solving sessions, one amongst A3 members and a following joint session with the Association of Program Directors in Radiology to tackle challenges facing chief residents. Potential topics include core exam preparation, communication between chiefs and program directors, and managing residents with deficiencies.

We will also be bringing back the popular ideas forum, which is a closed A3 session, to offer an opportunity for chief residents to talk candidly about issues at their programs and how other chiefs may be handling similar issues. Finally, we will again have the rapid, case-based review sessions encompassing the topics on the core exam, including physics, spread throughout the week.

AUR programming content aside, we will also have many social events including the welcome reception, annual Beer and Pretzel session, and an informal A3 evening event. Lastly, being in Orlando, don't miss the opportunity to check out the world-renowned amusement parks. On behalf of the Executive Committee, I hope you can join us for this amazing weeklong experience!

2018 Gold Medal Award Highlight

Dr. Carolyn Meltzer is a recipient of an AUR Gold Medal Award.

Dr. Meltzer is from Emory University where she serves as the William Patterson Timmie Professor and Chair of the Department of Radiology and Imaging Sciences. Dr. Meltzer has spent her career as a neuroradiologist and



nuclear medicine physician with NIH-funded research on the application of PET to understanding neurore-ceptor funciton and dysfunction. She is known for investing her energey in developing faculty, trainees, and students. While at Emory, Dr. Meltzer has also served as the Director of the Research Technologies Program for the Atlanta Clinical and Translational Science Institute.

A3CR2 Outstanding Teacher Award

We would like to congratulate Dr. Alberto Simoncini from Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center Shreveport for being selected as the winner of this year's A3CR2 Outstanding Teacher Award. Dr. Simoncini became the residency program director in the fall of 2016, and since that time, his residents report a "renewed sense of hope" in the program.

In their nomination letter, the LSUHSC-S residents shared that he has revamped the residency didactic curriculum and instituted their first structured reading program. Dr. Simoncini attended every resident lecture for an entire academic year in order to experience their education first hand and make changes for improvement. Not only has he given dozens of impromptu lectures himself, he has invited more physician lecturers to diversify learning opportunities and helped initiate a weekly interesting case conference. He has also instituted a new policy for research and has substantially increased residents' scholarly achievements.

His residents note that he genuinely values their input and routinely solicits suggestions for improvement. This has resulted in numerous positive changes including a new physics lecturer, new teaching schedule and materials, a moonlighting program, and an IR call room, amongst many others.

In his short tenure as program director, Dr. Simoncini has already realized many successes, for example, an increase in DXIT exam scores by an aggregate 73% in 2017 and a 100% core exam pass rate. His residents report that conference attendance and participation



have "skyrocketed," and there has been an increase in view-box teaching. This past academic year, he was voted "Teacher of the Year" by his residents.

The LSUHSC-S residents conclude their nomination: "Dr. Simoncini, a lifelong learner committed to teaching, has made a lasting impact not only in his section, but in our residency program as a whole. His approach to this residency has built a

new foundation for sustained academic excellence."

The topic for this year's Brogdon Panel is: "Professional Burnout." There are four invited panelists reflecting the various practice settings in Radiology as well as the different career positions:

Dr. Richard Gunderman MD, PhD is an academic pediatric radiologist at Indiana University. He serves as Professor and Vice Chairman in the Department of Radiology. He also holds appointments in the departments of Pediatrics, Medical Education, Philosophy, Liberal Arts, Philanthropy, Medical Humanities and Health Studies at Indiana University. Dr. Gunderman will be providing a big picture view of the issues related to Professional Burnout and discuss the importance of the issue. He will overview burnout and professional stressors including both those that are real and perceived.

Dr. Corrie Yablon is an academic musculoskeletal radiologist at the University of Michigan. She serves as Associate Professor of Radiology, Program Director of the Musculoskeletal Radiology Fellowship, and Chair of the Residency Selection Comitteee. In addition to providing a female perspective on the panel, Dr. Yablon will discuss her experience in both private practice and academics.

Dr. Kurt Schoppe is an abdominal/interventional private practice radiologist at Radiology Associates of North Texas. In addition to his administrative roles for one of the largest private practice groups in Radiology, Dr. Schoppe also has broad experience in health care policy with the American College of Radiology. He currently serves as an advisor to the Relative Value Unit Update Committee (RUC) which helps to decide payments for medical services on a national level. He will be discussing the stresses and intellectual reward associated with private practice and involvement in health care policy.

Dr. Dexter Mendoza is a fourth year radiology resident at Emory University where he serves as a Chief Resident. Dr. Mendoza is the vice president of the American Alliance of Academic Chief Radiology Residents (A3CR2). He will be discussing the resident perspective of burnout and unique stressors for residents.

CHIEF RESIDENT SURVEY RESULTS



For over 40 years, the chief residents at the Mallinckrodt Institute of Radiology have conducted a survey of radiology chief residents across the country on behalf of A3CR2 to follow trends in residency programs, resident education, chief resident responsibilities, and core exam preparation. Topics on this year's survey include the integration of interventional radiology training with the traditional diagnostic radiology residency, core exam preparation methods, and after-hours

attending coverage. New this year are questions about how chief residents will change with the new IR pathways and a look into resident exposure to informatics, 3D-printing, and global health. We look forward to sharing the results at the 2018 AUR meeting in Orlando.
